Tidings Tips: Save Your Home from Phantom Energy Loss

Most electronics and appliances still use energy for standby power when they're plugged in even though turned off. Wasted energy—called phantom load or ghost energy—is not always invisible. A glowing light on any electronic device means it is still on, and it's also true



of any device with a remote or a power-pack plug, chargers for cell phones, and appliances with lighted dials. Standby power can amount to 5% of home energy use! Save it instead with these solutions:

- Use a power strip/surge suppressor to disconnect. Don't run entertainment electronics, computers, and peripherals (printer, modem, router, fax) 24/7. Turn off all equipment that will be idle for two hours. For longer periods, unplug. Make it easy by putting devices on a surge suppressor strip. Flipping one switch disconnects everything, but the suppressor still functions.
- Use your computer's power-saving features. Set your system software to activate sleep mode for the monitor and processor. Screensavers don't save energy.
- Some ENERGYSTAR®-certified office equipment can save up to 90% on energy costs. ENERGYSTAR® computers can use 70% less energy, with a sleep mode of about 4 watts.
- Disconnect battery chargers when not in use. Chargers draw energy even when the battery is removed.

Remain Safe After the Storm

All residents of Florida should be accustomed to storms ranging from severe thunderstorms with dangerous lightning to severely damaging hurricanes and tornadoes, requiring evacuation.



Once threatening weather has passed, here are some tips on the steps to take when your power has gone out, or if you are returning to your home after having to evacuate. For power outages, call our 24-hour emergency number at 904-247-6171.

- Assume all cables and wires are energized and stay away.
- Keep away from flooded and debris-laden areas because they may hide downed power lines.
- If you leave your home, turn off appliances that may have been operating when the power went out, or turn off your main breaker.
- Avoid driving in damaged areas, as you can interfere with rescue operations and threaten your own safety.
- Always operate generators outside and connect appliances or equipment directly to it.

If your home appears to be water damaged:

- Always look for downed power lines when leaving or approaching your home. Never touch a downed line and call Beaches Energy to report downed lines at: 904-247-6171.
- Always pay attention to all electrical wires and equipment. If you have any doubts about your home's electrical system or are unsure of how to proceed, call a professional, licensed electrician.

Get Protection from Energy Surges at the Meter

A First Line of Defense: plugging appliances into home surge suppressors is a familiar way to protect appliances from lightning strikes, which can surge electricity into power lines. A meterbased surge arrester—installed by Beaches Energy Services stops the surge at the meter, before it enters your home. It handles surges greater than plug-in suppressors.

- Computers and media equipment can be super-sensitive to surges. Also, they usually have another electrical entry point, such as a telephone or cable line. We recommend that customers use high-quality plug-in suppressors for electronics.
- Lightning surges can destroy expensive motorized appliances like refrigerators and air conditioning. We offer this program to give customers peace of mind. The residential monthly charge of \$3.50 includes free installation, maintenance, and a limited damage warranty.

Our meter-based surge arrester device is strictly a power line surge suppressor that will protect all motor-driven appliances, from pool pump to dishwashers.
